Hello Brighton Methodist Church Family,

My name is Raechal Friess, and I am honored to serve as the Brighton Methodist Church Care Team Lead. I'm a Life Coach and Spiritual Director, and I'm blessed to be a wife to my husband, Greg, and a mother to our five children. We live on the west side of Brighton, in the Todd Creek area, and have called Brighton home since 2021 after moving from Castle Rock. I'm thrilled to be part of this vibrant community and excited to join the leadership team at Brighton Methodist Church.

My journey into Spiritual Direction was born out of a deep calling that unfolded over several years. I felt a persistent and heartfelt tug to work with individuals suffering from the wounds of trauma—those struggling to move beyond their pain to envision a new path forward. Unsure of how to act on this calling, I turned to my church pastor for guidance, and she suggested that I explore becoming a Spiritual Director.

A Spiritual Director walks alongside others on their faith journey, helping them discover or deepen their relationship with their Higher Power. Through compassionate and attentive listening, we guide individuals to notice where God—or their Higher Power—is moving in their lives. That advice set me on a life-changing path.

In 2018, I became a certified Spiritual Director through Benet Hill Monastery in Colorado Springs. Around the same time, I earned my certification as a Professional Life Coach through the Certified Life Coach Institute. I am



continuing my studies and am an Oblate Novice with Benet Hill Monastery, where I am studying the Rule of Saint Benedict and learning how to take the gospel beyond the church walls and into the world.

I'm incredibly grateful for the opportunity to step into this role and look forward to walking alongside each of you as we grow together in Faith, Hope, and Love. My door is always open, and I invite you to reach out—whether to share your story, seek guidance, or simply say hello.

A Legend of the Gifts of the Magi

A story given by a friend to Mary Allen, shared with help and support from Karen Lemke.

Matthew 2:1-2 Now after Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea in the days of Herod the king, behold, wise men from the east came to Jerusalem, saying, "Where is he who has been born king of the Jews? For we saw his star when it rose and have come to worship him."

11 And going into the house, they saw the child with Mary his mother, and they fell down and worshiped him. Then, opening their treasures, they offered him gifts, gold and frankincense and myrrh.

Have you ever wondered what Mary and Joseph did with the gold, the frankincense, and the myrrh which the wise men brought to them on that Holy Night so many centuries ago? If you'll listen closely, I'll tell you the wonderful story of "what happened to the gifts of the wise men..."

The morning after the wise men left, Mary gathered her precious little baby into her arms and went to the entrance of the stable where she gazed out over the quiet little town of Bethlehem. Her eyes felt heavy, for sleep had been impossible for her that night. Before her, the town lay peacefully at rest.

The stars above were like twinkling diamonds on a canopy of velvet. On distant hills, she could easily distinguish the forms of sleeping sheep and their shepherds lingering near by.

For a long time she stood there, not moving a muscle. But within her heart, thoughts and ideas were racing like a swift stream.

As her eyes drank in the distant darkness she could see again those three strange men...like kings...with long white beards and costly robes. They said they had come from the East to worship a King.

As the dawn broke, Mary could see small puffs of smoke, as the women of Bethlehem were preparing breakfast. How she longed to be back in Nazareth.



Soon Mary returned to the pallet of straw that served as her bed. The coarse straw reminded her of her humiliation. Her baby – born in a stable. Aloud she cried, "If this is the Messiah, why was he born here – in this stable?" Tears came to her eyes.

Then her mind turned to another thought. This was the fourth day now; they only had four more days in which to carry out the age old custom of temple presentation. As she had done many times before, she quoted to herself the scripture:

*"for a son, or for a daughter, she shall bring a lamb of the first year for a burnt offering, and a young pigeon, or a turtledove, for a sin offering, unto the door of the tabernacle of the congregation, unto the priest." **Leviticus 12:6, Luke 2:22-24***

Where would they find the money to make the proper offering for their child? And there would have to be spices to perfume the synagogue, and a payment for the priests. And only four days were left for the Presentation.

Suddenly Mary rose to her feet. "The gifts!" Yes, the gifts that the wise men brought. God had provided for His Own. They could take the frankincense and trade part of it for a pair of turtledoves, and use the rest to perfume the temple. For the first time that night, her burden of uncertainty and fear turned into joy.

With his unmovable expression, Joseph drank in each word, not missing a syllable as Mary unfolded her plan for the Infant's Presentation. After she had finished, he continued standing there, staring into the fire. Mary searched his face, hoping for a clue to his answer.

Breaking the silence, he replied in measured syllables. "Mary, the gifts which the strangers brought are valuable. I could sell them, buy my own shop, and be my own master. We could have a better living than before. Those gifts mean the end of poverty. Don't let sentiment ruin our future."

"But Joseph, they are not our gifts. They gave them to our baby. You know the law. It will soon be the eighth day. And if He is the Messiah, we should not even think of breaking one of God's commandments. Oh Joseph, I believe God sent the frankincense to be used at His Presentation."

Mary's persistence triumphed. It was hard for Joseph to give up the idea of a shop of his own, but the weight of Mary's argument, coupled with his own knowledge of the law, led him on the eighth day to the market place where he traded part of the frankincense for two doves. The rest of the ointment would be used to perfume the temple. **Luke 2:22**

God had provided.

On the night of the Presentation, it was Joseph's turn to lay awake. Perhaps he could still buy a shop with the other two gifts.

Suddenly the room was like daylight and a



Voice said unto him, "The baby Jesus is the Christ Child. He was prepared before the ages to save the world from sin. I charge thee to watch over Him, and care for Him, and raise him as you would your own son. The way will not be easy. I have come to warn you. You must flee this land and go to Egypt. This place is no longer safe for Him. Do not tarry a single day. God will guide you and provide for you. Peace be unto you." **Matthew 2:13**

The light subsided and the angel was gone.

This time it was Mary who objected, "My mother will worry. And our clothes. We must buy another donkey, and food! Joseph, we can't make a trip. A trip takes money, and you said yesterday that you only had seventeen shekels. That won't buy a donkey. Oh Joseph, it was only a dream."

"No. An angel told me to take care of Him as I would my own son, I dare not disobey."

"But the money?"

"He said that God will provide...And Mary, you are right! Those gifts are from God." A great light broke across Joseph's face, as the words gushed from his mouth.

"God sent those wise men. The chest of gold nuggets was meant for this trip. They will take care of us for two years, maybe even three

or four. I will go as soon as day breaks and buy a donkey, and clothes, and food. And to think, we were chosen by God..." Joseph's voice trailed off in wonderment and amazement.

By noon the next day more than a dozen miles lay between the Holy Family and Bethlehem, and they "departed into Egypt."

God had provided.

Mary and Joseph spent over two years in Egypt. They used the gold sparingly and wisely in buying the necessities of life. It lasted three years. When only two nuggets were left in the chest, Joseph felt that the very fact that the gold was running low was God's sign that they were to return.

The journey back to Palestine was a pleasant one for the family. At last they came to Nazareth, found a home, and fell into the routine of village life.

The years came and went for Jesus as they do for anyone. When Joseph died, the town wags remembered Jesus' words about doing His Father's business. Even Mary finally convinced herself that Jesus had been talking about assuming the business of Joseph.

Then had come the inevitable day, when Jesus laid down His carpenter's tools, turned the shop over to James, bid farewell to Mary, and left home. He traveled southward to Jerusalem, then crossed over to the Jordan, where He was baptized by His cousin, John.

Mark 1:9-11

Mary often reflected about the early years of Jesus' life. Although she had never told Him about the visits of the angels, or the three kings with their gifts, or why they had lived in Egypt, she realized that He knew. She was proud of His achievements.

Yet, Mary was still troubled. Not a week passed, but that she went to her closet and there took out the chest that once housed the gold. Now it contained a sealed flask, wrapped in heavy toweling. The flask contained the myrrh, the last of the three gifts that the strange men had given her.

It was the evening before the celebration of the Passover. **Exodus 12:12-14; 13:10** Tomorrow she was going to Jerusalem to see her Son. As she thought of Jesus, she again went to the closet, took out the chest and unwrapped the flask. It contained the myrrh – the ointment for the dead.

The next few days were as a blur in the mind of Mary. **John 11:55-57 Mark 14:1-2** The trip to Jerusalem, the excitement of the town, the talk of betrayals and trials, the flask of myrrh. Somehow that vessel told Mary that it was in the will of God that Jesus must die. She realized that within a few hours, that myrrh would anoint the broken body of her Son.

Despite her friends' protests, Mary attended the execution. **John 19:1-34** She saw the frenzied crowd as they yelled at the sight of Jesus' blood. She witnessed with her own eyes the agony, the suffering, and the pain of Jesus, as he hung upon the cross. She shuddered as the spear tore into His flesh. With her own ears, she heard Him say, "It is finished," and she saw His head drop to His chest.

And all the while, Mary clasped the flask to herself and repeated, "**God has provided.**"

This then, is the legend of what happened to the gifts of the wise men – the frankincense, the gold, the myrrh.

Kyung Kim

Kyung Kim, clergy in the Mid-Texas Conference, shares his story which is one of faith, sacrifice, and unwavering dedication to answering God's call. As a clergy member of the Mid-Texas Conference of the Global Methodist Church and an active-duty chaplain with the U.S. Army, Kyung's journey reflects the challenges and blessings of serving both the church and the nation.

I am not from Texas. I moved to Texas in July of 2023, when I resigned from my church, UMC, in North Georgia Conference. I applied for the membership with Global Methodist Church prior to moving, but the process was not finalized until after moving to Fort Cavazos, Texas, once all the legal matters of disaffiliation in North Georgia was settled.

I moved to Fort Cavazos, Texas, to serve with US Army as an active duty chaplain. I had served with Army reserve for over five years while pastoring a church. My church, Jones Chapel in Danielsville, Georgia, was very supportive and understanding of my role as a chaplain with Army reserve. I loved pastoring Jones Chapel. We worked together to navigate through the challenges of COVID19 and through the challenges of disaffiliation. I loved Jones Chapel family and still love them greatly. I loved pastoring Jones Chapel, which is now a Global Methodist Congregation following the disaffiliation.



Currently, I am on a deployment with my unit to Europe. My wife and two children are in Texas. Leaving Georgia to move to Texas was a big decision and a challenge. I was ordered by the US Army to go to Fort Cavazos in the summer of 2023, and I knew that the deployment was in the schedule for the unit that I was assigned to. With an agreement and support from my wife (thank you!), we made a move. Moving to a new place, and then shortly after, being separated from the family. And, leaving a loving church family to be a chaplain for the Soldiers. Is this the cost of the call?

I have been asked, "Why did you decide to be a chaplain?" While serving as a reserve chaplain, I saw opportunities to be with people who wouldn't come to the church. As an active duty chaplain, I have opportunities to work with Soldiers. Some are Christians. Many are not. Some have grown up or have church experiences but have drifted away from faith. God loves them all, and He seeks to find one more lost sheep.

While being with the unit in deployment, I get to be a pastor to my Soldiers, 24-7. Every week, I lead Christian worship, preach, teach the Bible, provide pastoral counseling, and more. Active Christians, like Will, Ben and Mandy, are continuing their faith journey through the Chapel services and activities while on deployment. Then, there are those

who are finding their way back to faith, like Jeremy, Issac, Jessica, Sean, etc. And, ones like Nate and Ashley have never heard about the love of God through Jesus Christ, and now heard the gospel. This is the field of harvest. To all Soldiers, regardless of their religion or interests in any faith, I have opportunities to do no harm and to do good all I can. As John Wesley said, "You have nothing to do but to save souls. Therefore, spend and be spent in this work. And go not only to those that need you, but to those that need you most. It is not your business to preach so many times, and to take care of this or that society; but to save as many souls as you can; to bring as many sinners as you possibly can to repentance." - Conversation with Francis Asbury, Thomas Coke, and others, 1784. Being an Army Chaplain gives me opportunities to talk about God's unfailing love and to invite the sinners to the sonship of our loving God who is gracious, full of compassion, and slow to anger.

The call comes with the cost. I will miss all the holidays with the family and the birthdays of my children this year. But the call is clear. Jesus said, "Go and make disciples of all nations". (Matthew 28:19). First command is to go. Where are we going to make disciples? How are we reaching to those who would not come to the church? I have witnessed the setting of Army as a snapshot of the pluralistic and secular culture of the world. The spiritual battles are ongoing over the lives and the families. This is where God said for me and my family to "GO", to witness boldly in order that the souls will be saved. And so, here I am.

The annual church Picnic will be on Sunday, August 24th at 11:00 at the church after church service.

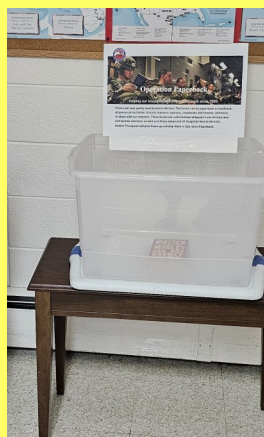
Saturday, October 25th, will have the annual Joan Hahn Chili Cookoff and Game Night at 5 pm.
